

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Scott "Hambone" Anderson (KJ4MFW)

During this time, I had two buddies who were also hams and we formed a club called: *Three Guys with Radios*. We participated in lots of portable operations and special events.

I heard this on the radio last week... " My neighbor was telling me he loves German food and


recently placed an order online. He said the sauerkraut had arrived, but the "wurst" has yet to come!"



HOT NEWS ARTICLE! RADIO THEORY CAUSES COMMOTION!



GOLDEN SPIKE, MONTANA – Buttery biscuits were thrown and voices were raised in anger at last month's meeting of the Gold Diggers Amateur Radio Club. According to witnesses, the proceedings turned tense after the Treasurer's report as Club president Lou Rodden's brother-in-law presented the monthly program.

Visiting from Square Butte Township, Nebraska, Mike Yuness told the group he has developed a technique which will "revolutionize radio broadcasting."

The amateur geologist and ham radio operator says

he's come up with a way to ionize the Earth's molten core of magma and use it to send radio signals to the far corners of the globe.

As members lunched on braised beef tips and unlimited onion rings, Yuness raised the question: "Why go around the earth...when you can go through it?"

Brown – who makes a comfortable living selling HF antennas made from recycled lawn chairs – says Yuness is only trying to collect money for his GoFundMe account and has no credible facts to back up his ionized magma core theory.

Dodging the rolls, Yuness yelled, "I've had a number of heated exchanges about this topic in online forums, BUT I KNOW I'M CORRECT!"

Brown claims Yuness and Rodden want the GoFundMe money to pay for their next trip to the Dayton Hamvention in the spring.





<u>Ukraine Maintains Ham Radio</u> <u>Silence in State of Emergency</u>

Radio amateurs in Ukraine appear to be diligently maintaining radio silence as the state of emergency declared there just prior to the

Russian military invasion remains in effect. A February 24 decree from President Volodymyr Zelensky included "a ban on the operation of amateur radio transmitters for personal and collective use." The Ukraine Amateur Radio League (UARL/LRU) reported this past week that it has received many messages of encouragement from the worldwide amateur radio community. "The LRU informed international amateur radio organizations about Russia's military invasion of Ukraine," said the message from UARL Vice President Anatoly Kirilenko, UT3UY. "To date, there have been many reports from radio amateurs around the world in support of Ukraine."

The International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) has adopted a neutral stance. "IARU is an apolitical organization focused on promoting and defending amateur radio and the amateur radio services," the IARU said. "The amateur radio service is about selfinstruction in communications and friendship between people." IARU Region 1 has said it continues to monitor the development and expects all radio amateurs "to follow their national laws and regulations." IARU Region 1 also re-posted part of an advisory from the Deutscher Amateur Radio Club (DARC) HF Committee on February 27. "Any radio amateur currently transmitting from Ukraine is risking his or her life. If you hear a Ukrainian station, do not broadcast its call sign, location, or frequency — whether on the band, in a cluster, or on social media. You may be putting lives at risk." The DARC's overarching advice: "In the current situation, the best we can do is listen." Ukraine's assigned amateur radio call sign prefixes include EMA – EOZ and the more commonplace URA – UZZ. Some stations with Ukrainian call signs may still be active, because an exception to the amateur radio ban was made for stations in the Donbas region of eastern Ukraine (eastern Donetsk and Luhansk oblasts), which have special legal status owing to Russia's occupation since 2014.

In a Facebook post, Poland's IARU member-society PZK has offered available Winlink nodes in Poland for any licensed refugees. If you are a licensed amateur radio operator, you can send information by email to your relatives in Poland or Emergency Services via the Winlink system. Polish Winlink nodes are active on 160, 80, and 20 meters: SR5WLK, 3.5955 MHz USB; SR3WLK, 14.111 MHz USB, and SP3IEW, 1.865 MHz USB. It has been observed that several Russian military HF stations including the famous UVB-76 Buzzer have been jammed with either the Ukrainian national anthem, or various meme-type songs. It is likely that these stations are being jammed mostly by civilian activists, or members of the activist hacker collective known as Anonymous, rather than any military organization.
