WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Happy New Year SPARK!

I'm very thankful for each one of you that has been involved with the Sedalia-Pettis Amateur Radio Klub this last year! As we move into 2023, I hope you have HAM radio plans or goals for this New Year. If not already, I'd like to ask a favor of you -- Please put Ham Radio on your list of New Year's Resolutions.

Here are some ideas to consider:

If you are not yet a licensed Ham Radio Operator or know someone that is not licensed, please get your license and encourage others to do the same this year. If you have not yet passed your General or Extra test, do it this year. Having trouble studying or passing? Have a look at some tips on this Web-Site that I think will be helpful. HamStudy.org: Cutting edge amateur radio study tools and look under the links section.

Try something. I've heard some say that there are 100 different kinds of Ham Radio, and there's something there for everyone that's for sure. FM repeaters and HF SSB honestly just scratch the surface. You already have a computer I'm sure, so be mindful that new digital and sound card modes seem to appear monthly as a new common mode. Not all that long ago, we had not heard of FT-8. It's now, by many accounts, the most popular HF Digital mode and we know if your ears are not the best, this makes a great mode for you! (Don (KF0ARQ) can attest). Have you tried 6 Meters yet? "The Magic Band "has been known to yield some exciting contacts and as you know from talk during our meetings our 6 meter repeater will be in full swing later this year. Or maybe try some SSB or CW on 2 Meters this year. Remember that every Ham has full privileges on all of the bands above 30 MHz Antennas for VHF and UHF are small and easy to construct from basic hardware store parts, Dwayne KB9TQJ will be getting us in the right direction with his upcoming workshop. Remember It doesn't have to be pretty, even ugly antennas will radiate just as well. Use your imagination and let's try something different!

Do something. Set an achievable Ham Radio goal for the year -- and then work at it! Earn <u>DXCC</u> (<u>DXCC</u> <u>Rules (arrl.org)</u>) or <u>WAS</u> (<u>WAS (arrl.org)</u>), maybe on a single band? Better your contest score by 10%? Get your CW speed up to 20 WPM or just build on what you learned from Connie's CW Class? Reorganize and rewire the shack? Order a HAM Antenna book, Operating Guide book, or just any material to increase your technical knowledge? Convert your paper logs to electronic format and start using Logbook of the World or at least QRZ log books? And remember like the saying goes "Whether you think you can or you think you can't, you're probably right." Just do it this year!!

Build something. Not all that many years ago, I tasked myself with some soldering projects, there are plenty on-line to choose from, but I honestly found it very fun to make something that I can actually use which were a couple AM and FM radios, clocks, testers and a few others items. It really gave me a better understanding to the electrical components of a HAM radio and turned out to be quite fun in the process. As we go into this New Year remember our workshops, there are going to be plenty of opportunities to build something, but don't wait on that, make something on your own and bring it to a meeting for show and tell!! Also, one of our members Chris KC0TKS has some really cool QRP kits; just ask him about them sometime, you will be impressed. Download a free antenna modeling program and learn how to use it to design and build your own Homebrew

antenna. Order a kit and assemble it. Melt some solder and have fun! Once you start, I bet you'll be hooked.

Teach something. You know how to do things others don't, please share your knowledge! Please volunteer to help out on a club workshop to teach the basics to other members? Many topics can be of interest for instance a demonstration on crimping and using Anderson Powerpoles? Or properly installing coax connectors?

Become a "HAMbassador" for SPARK. Get just one person (or two, or three) interested in Amateur Radio and invite them to our meetings. Offer to demonstrate Ham Radio at a youth event or maybe even the Senior Center. I challenge you to draft a new youth member this year, our club has incentives for this, Paul (KD0ETL) /Marsha (KF0HYQ) and Dwayne (KB9TQJ) will provide fees and first time HT radio costs for free.

Get involved! Please attend our meetings! The camaraderie is great I really enjoy your company and our discussions! You don't need to volunteer for everything... select an area that interests you, and help with that. Even better, suggest an activity and then take the lead in organizing it. Something as simple as "I'm going to set up a portable station at the park on Saturday morning; everyone is welcome to come by!" This has been proven to be a favorite among members!! Check out the POTA (Parks On The Air) Web site for even more fun. Scott (KJ4MFW) has been our lead for the last year on this but he would like some help, as the weather gets nicer this spring I would like to resume a monthly POTA event for the club, but it take all of us to share in leading.

Most of all, resolve to have more fun with Ham Radio in 2023!! Once again, I am sincerely honored to be your club President and I wish you and your family the best for a happy, healthy, and safe 2023.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

This month's featured SPARK member is Don Weldon (KFØARQ)...alias 'Clown Extraordinaire'! Don has a life-skill that I found intriguing and I felt many of our members would as well. Don shares experiences of 20+ years with us.

- Q. Did you ever go to Clown College?
- A. At the time I joined the Aarat Shrine Clown Unit, I went to Clown School with Priscilla Mooseburger. She had been with Barnum & Bailey Circus for a number of years and I spent time in her class learning costumes and makeup. I have performed at the Shrine Circus every year and have been a Shriner for 40 years.
- Q. What was your inspiration for becoming a clown?
- A. I rode little motorcycles with the Fun Kor for 10 years before becoming a clown. When the Kor disbanded, I joined the clown unit in KC. I liked the idea of dressing up and making kids smile.
- Q. What are the personas of the clowns you have in your arsenal? Do you have a favorite?
- A. 'Chief' is my #1 Clown. I portray him in most parades. 'Circus' is #2. The 'Hobo' clown is 'Dapper Don'...a gentleman's gentleman or butler. Depending on the


mood, I will do him now and then. My # 3 'Parade Only' costume was worn when I was in the Fun Kor.

- Q. Describe some of the skits you have done.
- A. Some of the skits could be intricate, but most involved slapstick. Lots of physical comedy with several clowns involved in a skit.
- Q. Tell us about being a senior clown who mentors the newcomers. What skills do you pass along to the newbies?
- A. Like Ham Radio have 'Elmers', clowns have 'Joeys'... senior clowns who help new clowns learn how to put on makeup, give suggestions on costumes and assist in choosing the 'character' of the clown-to-be. So many choices! Hobo, tramp, auguse (flesh colored face) or white face. As an example, my character, 'Chief' is an auguse character.
- Q.What have been some of your most enjoyable moments as a clown?
- A. All of them! The parades, the circus, special trips to group homes and visiting with individuals with special needs.
- Q. Where do clowns shop for clown clothing and props?
- A. There are shops online to get costumes, makeup, and props. Big feet are hard to find. They have to be handmade to an individual's measurements and are quite costly! One pair can cost \$500! It's like radio...you pay for what you want!

TECH TALK



NEW QUESTIONS ON GENERAL TEST EXAM

PAUL/ANCHOR: In the US, the General Class operators' license test is getting a new question pool. Stephen Kinford N8WB tells us what's changing.

STEPHEN: If you are a ham in the United States looking to upgrade to General in 2023, you can expect some changes in the new pool of questions that take effect on July 1st of 2023. The 432 questions were just released and the National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators' Question Pool Committee says they reflect significant changes: There are 51 new questions being introduced; 73 were removed. The committee believes the questions' level of difficulty is more balanced. These questions will be in use through June 30th of 2027.

Examiners can expect to see the new General exam booklets by mid-June of 2023. The ARRL advises hams that are using the 9th edition of the General Class License Manual or the 6th edition of the league's General Class Q&A to take their exam no later than June 30th before the changed questions come in.




BACKSTORY TO THIS ARTICLE

SIX METER FUN




Do you have any special or unusual skills? What's your favorite story about yourself?

A simple dipole will work or a vertical such as the Ringo Ranger AR-

6, also provides satisfactory results but do keep in mind, the bigger the antenna, the bigger the signal.




