#### **IN THE SPOTLIGHT**

This month we spotlight Mark 'Doc' Buckley (W3MEB) of 'Wa'shar', Missouri. I had the pleasure of interviewing Doc during my ride along to HAMBASH 2022 in April. This man is one of the



most humble and selfless individuals I believe I have ever met! He was obviously more interested in speaking of other Klub members' accomplishments than his own. Getting him to talk about himself was like pulling hen's teeth!...but what I got was pure gold! I think you'll see what I mean. Doc was born to serve. As early as his high school years he was seeking out as much training in first aid and medical technology as a 17 year old kid could muster. As soon as he graduated high school, during the height of the Vietnam War, he joined the Navy. He spent time deployed to Vietnam. After his tour at the Naval Hospital in Annapolis, he went to Portsmouth VA and received advanced training as an

Independent Duty Corpsman, As an Independent Duty Corpsman, Doc had many deployments all over the world. One of these was to the West Indies, Grand Turk Island, where he got his first Ham call, (VP2FC) in 1974. At that time, he was Primary Health Care provider for 150 individuals on the island for twelve months. During that tour, he was recommended for 'Sailor of the Year'. He didn't receive the honor but was 'rewarded' (huh?) with a two-year tour to Antigua as Senior Medical Department Rep for 300 people. He was then sent to Dayton, Ohio as a medical Inspector/Instructor at the Marine Corps Reserve Center. Doc also served in the SEABEES for three years as Senior Medical Representative. Anytime Doc was stationed stateside he worked as a Paramedic and was one of the first 50 in Maryland to hold that position. He received a most deserved decoration from the Marine Corps. He was awarded the 'Navy-Marine Corps Medal' for saving a life during a water rescue. This is the highest peace time award bestowed in peace time military. It is equated to the military Bronze Star. Doc completed his military career as the Leading Chief in Training and the Emergency Services Department at the Naval Hospital in Pensacola, Florida. If you recognize a common thread in Doc's life story, it has been one of service to others. His journey has led him to careers as a reserve cop in Ohio where he also worked as a LT Firefighter Paramedic at Huber Heights PD part time. He has also served as a full time cop in Pensacola and basically held every volunteer medical/rescue/safety position in the business!...AND he has been an educator and trainer for those positions as well. Doc is currently with FEMA and will be transferring from the Communications section to Security in the near future. In addition to his volunteerism in the medical and safety arenas, he is also a member of the Shriners and Masonic organizations. Doc is truly the poster child for 'People Dedicated to Helping People'. He sees Ham Radio as a very important asset to the community and believes in paying the favor forward. The words he lives by are simple. As the educator he is...they ring true.

#### **TECH TALK**

## **DEDICATED TO OUR NEWEST HAMS de ARRL**

We've all been there where you are now! First contacts on the air..."Am I doing this right?" "I'm a little bit anxious...throwing my call out there for the first time!" Yep! We've all been there! Following is some information from ARRL that can make those first contacts a BREEZE! Also, some *review* which ALL of us can relate to!

#### The Radio Amateur's Code

The Radio Amateur is:

CONSIDERATE...and never knowingly operates in such a way as to lessen the pleasure of others.

LOYAL...and offers loyalty, encouragement and support to other amateurs, local clubs, the IRAU Radio Society in our country, through which Amateur Radio in the USA is represented nationally and internationally.

PROGRESSIVE...and keeps one's station up to date. It is well-built and efficient and operating practice is above reproach.

FRIENDLY...and operates slowly and patiently when requested; offers friendly advice and counsel to beginners; kind assistance, cooperation and consideration for the interests of others. These are the marks of the amateur spirit.

BALANCED...noting that Radio is a hobby, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school or community.

PATRIOTIC...and keeps station and skills always ready for service to country and community.

(Adapted from the original Amateur's Code, written by Paul M. Segal, W9EEA, in 1928)

# Why Amateur Radio Operators Are Also Called "Hams"?

The first wireless operators were landline telegraphers who left their offices to go to sea or to man the coastal stations. They brought with them their language and much of the tradition of their older profession. In those early days, every station occupied the whole spectrum with its broad spark signal. Government stations, ships, coastal stations and the increasingly numerous amateur operators all competed for time and signal supremacy in each other's receivers. Many of the amateur stations were very powerful. Two amateurs, working each other across town, could effectively jam all the other operations in the area. Frustrated commercial operators would refer to the ham radio interference by calling them "hams." Amateurs, possibly unfamiliar with the real meaning of the term, picked it up and applied it to themselves. As the years advanced, the original meaning has completely disappeared.

# **Making Your First Contact - Operating Tips**

The <u>phonetic alphabet</u> is helpful when the other station can't hear you well or when the operator is not a fluent speaker of English. Don't make up your own phonetics.

### Calling and Answering "CQ"-

To start a contact, call "CQ" or answer someone calling CQ. A CQ is a general call to get a random contact.

Before calling CQ, listen to find a frequency that unoccupied by any other station. This may not be easy, particularly in crowded band conditions. If the frequency seems clear, ask if the frequency is in use, followed by your call. "Is the frequency in use? This is NY2EC." If nobody replies, you're clear to call. Keep your CQ very short. If no one answers, call again. If you call CQ three or four times and don't get a response, try another frequency.

A typical SSB CQ goes like this:

"CQ CQ Calling CQ. This is AD5UAP, Alfa-Delta-Five-Uniform-Alfa-Papa."

When answering a CQ, keep the answer short. Say the call sign of the station once or twice, followed by your call:

"N2EEC N2EEC, this is AB2GD, Alfa-Bravo-Two-Golf-Delta."

# **Joining a Conversation in Process-**

Remember that private conversations don't exist in Amateur Radio. If you don't want to call CQ to start a conversation, you can join a conversation that is already in progress. Listen carefully to the operators.

Are they having an animated, involved discussion? If so, it may be a bit rude to interrupt unless you have something important to offer. If the chat seems casual, the operators may not mind someone else joining.

So how do you politely interrupt? The best approach is to wait for one station to stop transmitting and then quickly announce your call sign:

"Yes, Charlie, I hope to get the dipole soldered together this weekend if the weather holds up." "N1RL." "Ah...we have a breaking station. N1RL, go ahead!" Do not use the word "break." You may hear other hams doing this, but you should only say "break" when you need to interrupt because of an emergency.

#### When to Keep it Short-

Hams LOVE to talk, but there are times when you should keep the conversation short. For example, a  $\underline{DX}$  operator may be trying to contact as many people as possible, as rapidly as possible. Listen before you call. If the DX operator seems to be making short contacts (signal report and "good-bye"), it is best to do the same. If you are heard by the DX station, only give the information he is looking for – a signal report and your location. Do not attempt to engage him in conversation.

You may occasionally hear hams operating <u>special event stations</u>. These are temporary stations set up at events throughout the country: at county fairs, boat races, etc. Unless the special event operator sounds like they want talk more, keep the conversation short. This gives everyone else a chance to make their contacts.

If you hear a call like this: "CQ Contest! CQ Contest! This is W1AW. Contest!" you've stumbled across an on-the-air contest. The idea: Contact as many stations as possible during the contest period. You don't have to be involved in the contest to participate; your contact will count regardless. Just listen to the contest station and determine what he is looking for. Contest contacts require the exchange of specific information such as your state, county, etc. Find out what he needs before you call and make the contact short. Time is essential when it comes to a contest!

# Rag Chew - A Long Enjoyable Conversation-

"Rag chewing" is ham lingo for a long, enjoyable conversation. Start with the basics: your name, location, the signal report, and a brief summary of your station (how much power you're running and the kind of antenna you're using). Then get the other person to talk about himself. Hams can talk about anything, but there are some topics we try to avoid. Discussions of politics and religion tend to attract controversy and start arguments on the air. If it looks like your rag chew is heading in those directions, use good judgment. Does the other operator agree with your views? If not, will you be offended? Will he (or others) be offended? If you have doubts, it is best to change the subject. Conduct yourself as though anyone in the world might be listening at any time. Whenever you transmit, you're representing all of Amateur Radio.
